Lake City, December 10:—Last night a large and appreciative audience heard Professor Tate, Superintendent of Rural Schools, at the school auditorium. Prof Tate's address is one of the series given this winter under the subscription solicited commencement week. His lecture, "Schools in Switzerland," was illustrated with slides of pictures he

made while in Switzerland last year under the auspices of the United States Government studying the school systems of Switzerland. So vivid and interesting were the pictures and descriptions that the audience regretted to hear him say, "This is the last one." He spoke of our school building and the efficiency of our faculty in very complimentary terms, but suggested that with the growth of our community we would need a larger and more spacious building, and especially he stressed the fact that Professor Covington should have an assistant, giving him more time to inspect the different class-rooms and note the progress of the pupils in the several

grades. This is a long-felt want, and we sincerely trust that our faculty will be increased next year by the addition of one more instructor, making the number twelve, besides the music teacher.

Dr D M Ramsey, president of Greenville Female college, delighted his hearers with an excellent discourse at the Baptist church Sunday morning, and in the evening he delivered quite a telling address on education for women. We feel that his coming was quite helpful to this community and his next visit is anticipated with pleasure.

nettville this week.

Rev C C Derrick preached his farewell sermon Sunday morning and, despite the inclement weather, the church was well filled.
