SHOOTING AFFAIR IN

POLICEMEN, ATTACKED WITH KNIVES, USE THEIR GUNS WITH FATAL RESULT--ONE MAN DEAD.

Policemen George Ham and Charley McElveen, who Saturday afternoon in a clash with members of the Lee family, at Olanta, shot and killed Sam Lee and probably fatally wounded his son, Olin Lee. 'All of the evidence adduced at the Coroner's hearing points to the fact that the officers fired the shots only after they had been attacked and cut with knives, and their clubs had been wrested away from them, and in defense of their lives.

He was Mrs Bartow Smith last Thursday. thought to be mortally wounded, and physicians from Olanta and Florence stated he had no chance of recovery. Today, however, he was still alive, and seemed to have gained strength. The policemen were considerably bruised and cut, Mr Ham having no less than five knife marks about his face and neck. His life was probably saved by the adroitness with which Judge Knight, Magistrate at Olanta, diverted the force of the thrust aimed by Carson Lee at the policeman's throat.

'The Coroner's jury did not reach a verdict until early Sunday morning, the testimony submitted by the number of witnesses being voluminous. The verdict was that Sam Lee had come to his death from gunshot wounds at the hands of George Ham and Charley McElyeen. Coroner Gun turned the men over to the Sheriff who immediately placed them under arrest and brought them to Florence. The policemen had been on duty up to this time. At the inquest, Mr P H Arrowsmith of Lake City appeared in the interests of the State, while Mr Whiting of Florence represented the defendant officers for the town of Olanta.

'The occasion of the trouble is said to date back two years, when Sam Lee was given a severe thrashing by officers who had attempted to arrest him for creating a disturbance. It is said that since that time he has threatened he would have his re-


