

O K LAROQUE WILL BE BANK EXAMINER

TO BE SUCCEEDED AS PRIVATE SECRETARY TO GOV MANNING BY JOHN E PUCKETT.

Col O K LaRoque, private secretary to Governor Manning since September, 1915, has resigned that position to accept the office of State bank examiner, to which he was appointed by Governor Manning, succeeding Capt Ivy M Mauldin; resigned. Col LaRoque's resignation was effective March 1, and on the same day he assumed the duties of bank examiner.

In succession to Col LaRoque, as private secretary to Governor Manning, John Elliott Puckett, of Columbia, has been appointed. He began his official duties on March 1.

Col LaRoque, the new State bank examiner, is a native of Kinston, N C, but has been a resident of this State a number of years. He has had experience in the banking business, and prior to becoming the Governor's secretary was manager of an insurance company at Marion, S

C. He has many friends throughout the State, who will learn with pleasure of his good fortune. Col LaRoque is thirty-four years of age and married. He is a member of the Governor's military staff.

Col LaRoque announces that he will retain the present assistants to the bank examiner. They are: James H Craig, of Anderson, and Sidney Bruce, of Pickens, assistant examiners, and W W Bradley, of Abbeville, auditor assistant.

John E Puckett, who becomes private secretary to Governor Manning, was born in Tennessee twenty-six years ago. He is an A B of the class of 1910 of the University of the South at Sewanee. Mr Puckett came to South Carolina in 1913 from Birmingham, Ala, where he was engaged in the insurance business, and during his stay in Columbia he has been a reporter on the Columbia State. Mr Puckett is a member of the Charleston Light Dragoons, having just returned from the Mexican border with that command. He was company clerk with the rank of a first-class private. He is related to the well-known Elliott family of Beaufort and Columbia.

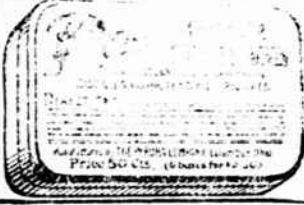

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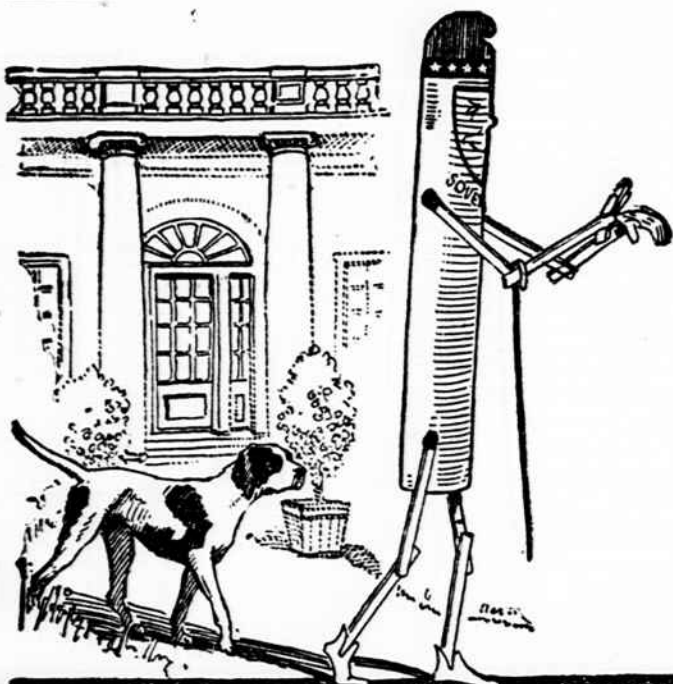
