At first it was thought that Hall had fallen asleep on the side of the track and had been struck by the engine, but this theory passed out of the minds of the people as a closer investigation was made as to the position of the dead body, the cuts and bruises on it and the record of the young man as a soldier. There is no doubt as to his death being caused by the train, but as to just how the young man was struck by it. no one knows. One theory is that he was standing by the fire with his gun across his shoulder and the train struck the muzzle of the gun, knocking him senseless into the fire. Another is that a loose hanging car door of a rapidly passing freight train struck him. Of the two theories the one of the gun seems most probable because the gun was damaged.
