Meeting of Teachers' Association.

On Saturday of last week a number of teachers, representing practically every school in Williamsburg county, met at the court house for the purpose of reorganizing the County Teachers' Association. Mr J V McElveen, County Superintendent of Education, called the meeting to order, and in a few well-chosen words gave the teachers a most cordial welcome, and impressed upon them the fact that their presence at the first meeting of the association was an evidence of their deep interest in their work and of their unflinching purpose to put forth every effort for educational advancement in the county.

The first question brought before the teachers was the election of officers for the association, resulting as follows: President, Miss Lillian Salters, Cedar Swamp; vice president, Mr R N Speigner, Hemingway; secretary-treasurer, Mr M F Montgomery, Kingstree. County Superintendent, Mr J V McElveen, and Mr J W Swittenberg, of the Kingstree school were elected to serve on the program committee.

The main topic for discussion at the first meeting of the teachers' association was the conservation of food. Mr Gray, of Charleston, who is a very enthusiastic advocate of the food conservation campaign, presented this matter to the teachers in a very forceful address. Mr Gray impressed upon his hearers the very urgent need for the conservation of food, and urged each teacher to impress this matter upon his or her pupils and patrons. Mr W H Welch, manager of the food conservation campaign for Williamsburg county, asked the teachers to put forth every effort for the success of this campaign in the county.

After an open discussion of their various problems and difficulties, the meeting was adjourned, to meet again the latter part of November.
