The purpose is rapidly being achieved, the insurance having passed the third billion mark in the total of policies written, and there are many military units in which

every member has taken insurance. The automatic insurance provided by the law is only partial and limited protection, payable only to wife, child or widowed mother and ceases after February 12, 1918. It is important, therefore, not only to the soldiers and sailors of the country but to their families and dependents, that before that date they avail themselves of the full government protection, which can go as high as \$10,000 and is payable to a wife, husband, child, grandchild, parent, brother, or sister.

The law also provides for the reeducation and rehabilitation of the totally disabled and monthly compensation to those disabled.


