Cecil Salmon, the 17 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Salmon, of Conway was drowned at Myrtle Beach Sunday. The body was recovered within a few hours after its disappearance.

Governor Cooper Saturday offered a reward of \$200 for the apprehension, delivery and conviction of the party or parties who nearly three months ago killed Edwin White, prominent citizen of the Centenary section of Marion county, and weighted the body in the waters of Little Pee Dee river. May 26, nine weeks after the crime had been committed, the body was found by a fishing party. A strong wire had been wound around the body and to the wire had been attached about 50 or 60 pounds of scrap iron. One bullet had been fired into the stomach. Mr. White had started to the school house, which is about one mile from his home, to assist his brother in the erection of a tombstone. He never showed up that afternoon, and nothing further was heard of him until the body was taken from the river.

and he would not permit them to impose upon the younger lads. In the contentions which inevitably arise on the playground, he early developed those traits of leadership and conciliation which have been characteristic of him ever since.

"He attended the village school until fourteen years of age, when he entered the Ohio Central College of Iberia, from which he was graduated, standing high in scholarship; and it was there, as editor of the college paper, that he first displayed a talent for journalism. 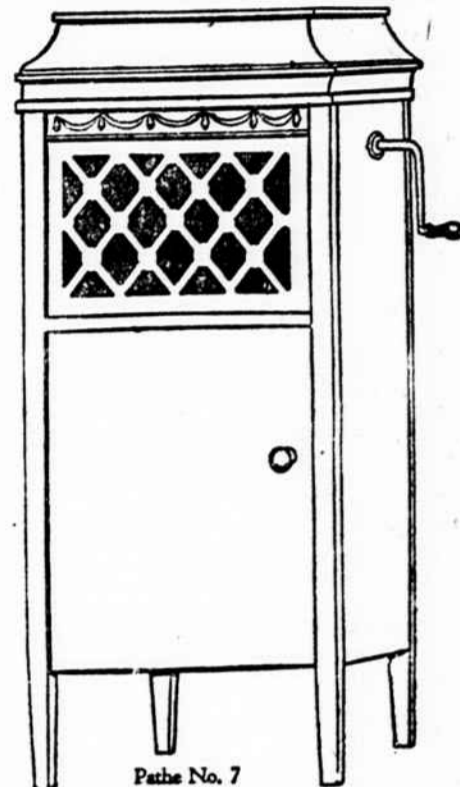
