

AN EATING MAN.

Good Appetites in Kingstree, But This Fellow Takes the Cake.

Special dispatch from Philadelphia to one of New York's big daily newspapers tells this story of a man with an appetite. We believed we had some prize appetites in Kingstree until we read about this man, Lee: William Lee always boasted of the fact that he could eat as much as six men at one sitting. Last Sunday he confided this to Michael Yaffee and William Smith. They would not take Lee at his word and demanded a demonstration with \$25 as the stakes in case, Lee won. If Lee lost he was to pay for the meal. The trio went to a restaurant where Lee, who is 6 feet, 4 inches tall and weighs 238 pounds, tucked a napkin under his chin and beckoned to the waiter. He first ordered a 12 pound turkey with stuffing. This vanished within forty-five minutes. He picked the bones clean. Smith and Yaffee then saw their cash going Lee-ward. Then in the words of John Paul Jones, Lee said: "I haven't started to eat."

He then ate fifty-three oysters, two pounds of pork chops, one dozen eggs, two slices of ham, a large beef stew, drank twelve cups of coffee, ate three loaves of bread, and during the meal drank six bottles of soda water. Then he stopped and Smith and Yaffee passed over the stakes to the diner. Now this story should end by Lee pushing back his chair, arising and saying, "Well, I guess I'll go home for supper now, but Lee didn't. Lee attempted to arise but found he was unable to do so. A look of pain came over his face and he muttered: "Get a doctor; get a doctor."

Yaffee telephoned for a physician who had Lee carried to his home suffering from indigestion. He recovered quickly, however, and that night said he would be ready for another marathon feed if the stakes amounted to \$25 and somebody paid the food and doctor bills.

A tax of \$1.25 on dogs, (which includes tag) due and collectible at time other taxes are paid. "Any person owning, harboring or maintaining a dog failing or refusing to return and pay the tax aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than five (\$5.00) dollars, nor more than twenty (\$20.00) dollars, one-half of which shall go to the person reporting such failure to pay said tax and one-half to the public school fund of the district in which said derelict occurs."—Section 4 of an Act to Provide an annual Dog Tax for the State of South Carolina and a Penalty for not Paying said Tax.

Drainage tax is due and payable at the same time with other taxes.

All parties between the ages of 21 and 60 years, inclusive, are liable, unless exempted by law, to a poll tax of \$1.00, also to a commutation tax of \$2.00.

Upon all unpaid taxes after December 31 a penalty of 1% will be added for January, 1% for February and 5% to the 15th day of March next, after which the books will be closed and executions issued upon all unpaid taxes.

Those who desire to pay their taxes through the mail may expedite matters by dropping the Treasurer a card asking for the amount of their taxes, so as to avoid sending the wrong amount, also stating the township or townships (if property is owned in more than one) and if possible give school district where property is located. After paying taxes, examine your receipts and see if all your property is covered, if not, see about it at once.

By following the above suggestions complications and additional cost may be avoided.
