GUITEAU TO BE HANGED. FORT WATSON.

About half a mile from Wright's Bluff landing, on the Santee River, is a curious mound of earth, which if carefully examined, might reveal some evidences of archæological value. This mound is about one hundred feet from the edge of bluff which overlooks the picturesque sheet of water known as Scotts Lake. It rises abrubtly in a perfectly level stretch of country, to the height of about forty feet, measuring about five hundred feet (in diameter) at the base, and thirty feet at its summit.
