The election to-day seems to be passing off quietly without any excitement. Lee is reported considerably ahead of Yackey at the Sumter box, and the straight Democratic ticket for State and County officers, the one which is voted by the majority. The colored voters are conspicuously absent at the State and County boxes.

A negro, while riding a horse at a speed on Sunday, near the edge of the woods, and the animal running into a tree, broke its neck. We learn that it was the property of Mrs. J. M. Epperson. A lively war is about to be commenced between the Town Council and the Doctors of Sumter. The latter have refused to pay what they regard as an unlawful tax, and the Council has levied upon their baggage. Garfield's experience with six Doctors does not seem to have increased the timidity of our Council, who will doubtless receive better treatment.

The election ordered by the Town Council to decide the matter of granting licenses for the sale of spirituous liquors within the incorporated limits, will be held on the first Tuesday in December. The managers of the election are Messrs. Joo. H. Eberhardt, F. F. Teicher and J. T. Edwards.

"The Newspaper Press of Charleston," is the title of a popular volume by Wm. L. King, of Charleston, S. C., which has recently undergone a second edition. It is a very entertaining book, and filled with interesting facts concerning the men and events connected with the city and its contemporaneous history. Much of the information, which it contains is unpublished elsewhere, except in the files of nearly forgotten newspapers, and might have been lost had they not been gathered by Mr. King in this little book. It will be valued by none so highly as those who love the "city by the sea," and especially the friends of the "stick and rale," whose history, as its title indicates, is the chief object of the work. If it has any defect, it consists in the lavish and indeterminate praise of all who are mentioned—an error which indicates the kind spirit of the author and those from whom he quotes.

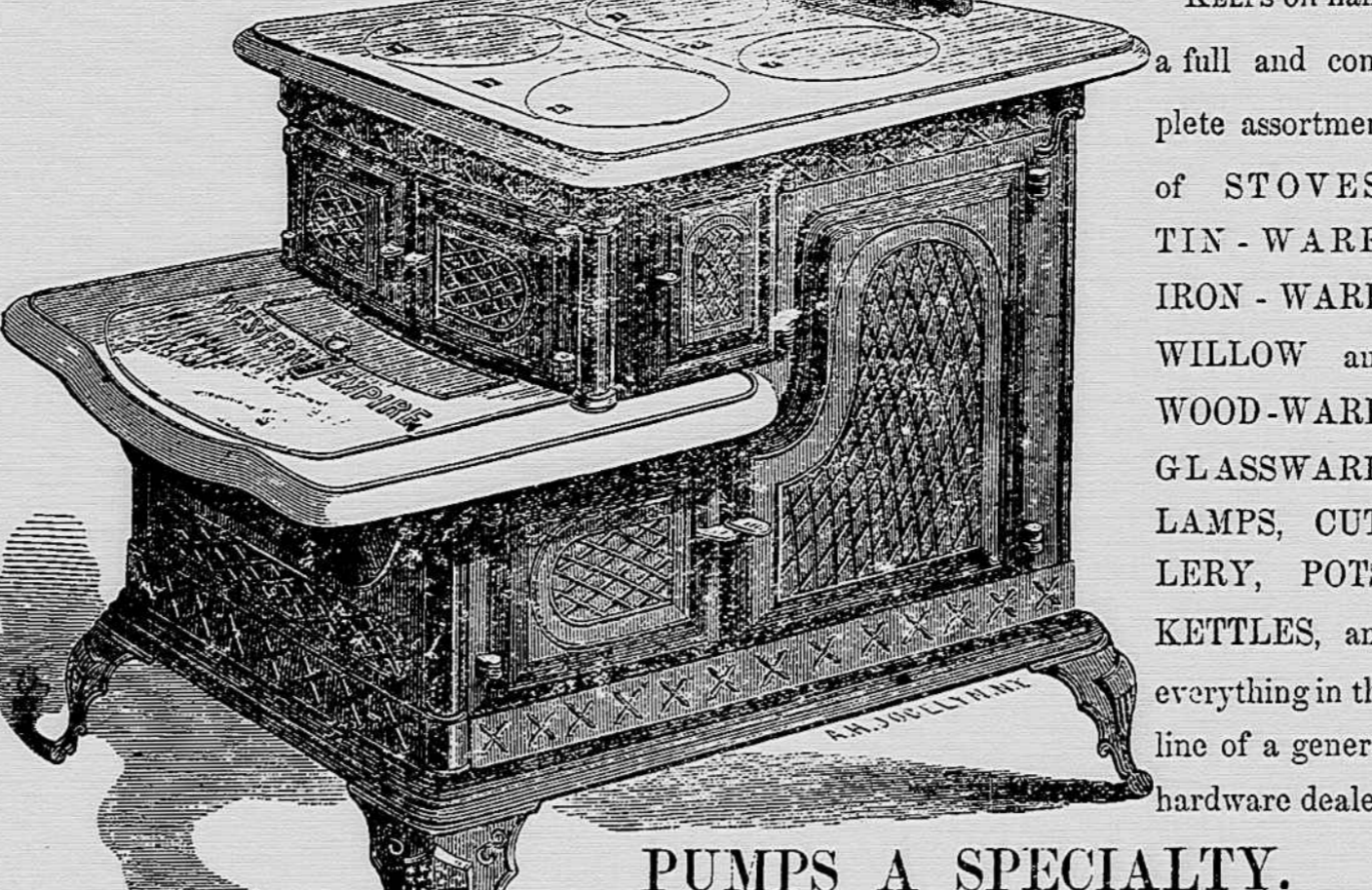

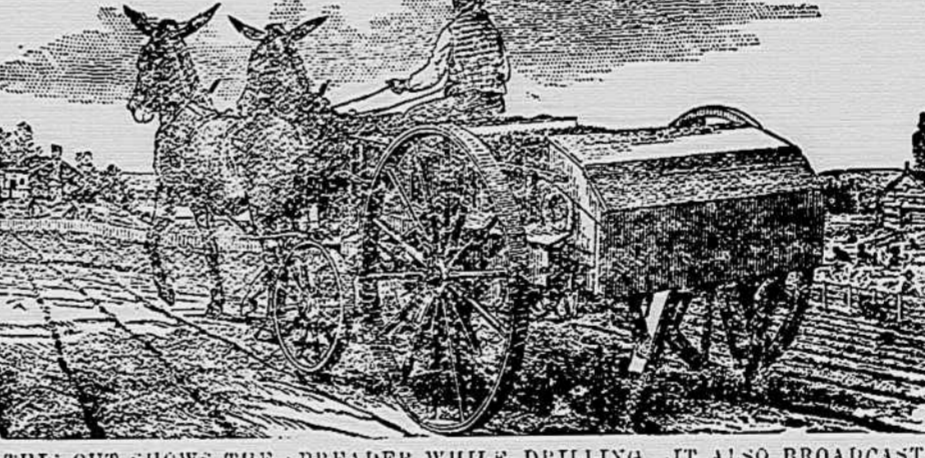

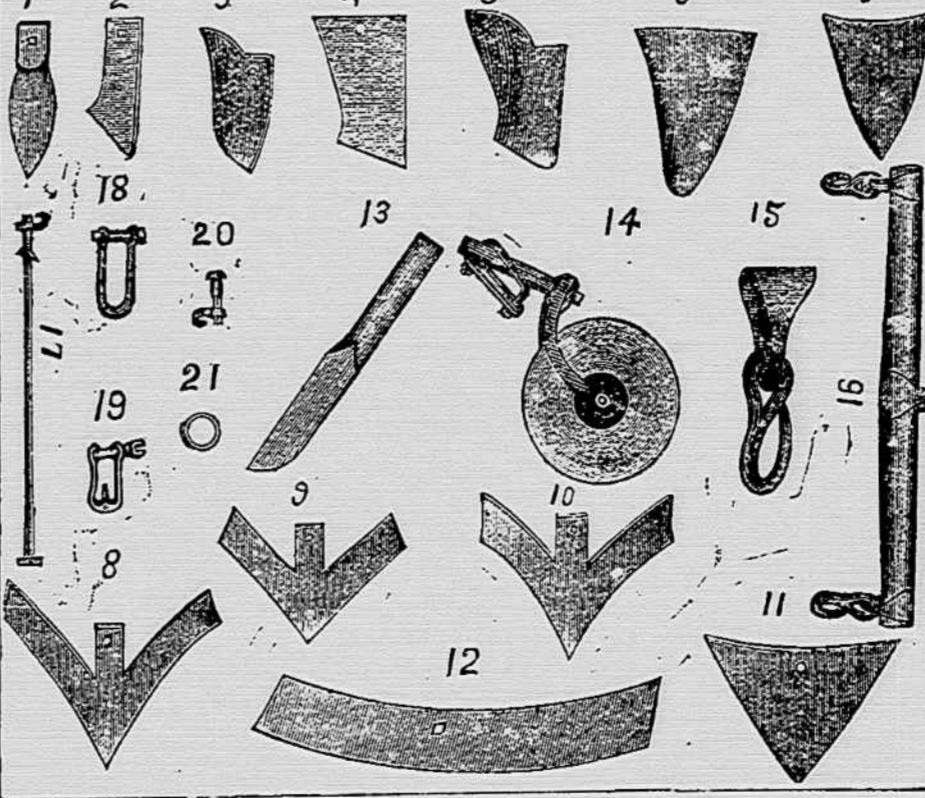
