The Cocoonery. We availed ourselves vesterday of the opportunity of visiting the cocoonery of the Sumter Silk Association, which is now kept in the residence on Washington street, lately

occupied by Mr. Murray. We had no idea of the manner of conducting such an enterprise, and found the cocoonery to be an object of real curiosity. Tables and shelves surround the room, in which a fire is kept burning to provide the necessary warmth to the worms. The worms are placed in shallow paper-box tops, some of them not over a half-inch in depth. These box-tops contain from 50 to 250 worms, according to

their age. A paper perforated with holes as large as a dime, is placed in the box, and on this the mulberry leaves are thrown, the worms crawling out through the holes to eat. The worms are very slow in their motions, Worthy Chief Templar of the Order of and peculiar in their habits. They live only about six weeks from their birth, shedding their skins four or five times. While shedding, they stand with heads erect, refusing to eat. After the last moulting, they climb upon little racks or ladders, and there commence to weave the silk thread, which they wrap round their bodies. They are then in the chrysalis state, and if left alone would convert themselves into moths, but just before that change comes on, they are destroyed it.






