The State Central Committee of the Republican Party of South Caroina met at Columbia, February 26, according to the call of Thos. E. Miller, of Beaufort, chairman, in a room at the United States Courthouse. The committee appointed the 15th of April as BISHOP BOWMAN'S OPINION the date for the meeting of the State Convention to elect delegates to the National Republican Convention. The State committee left it optional with the districts to elect their own delegates, and provided that the State Convention shall have power to elect delegates for such Congressional districts as do not make their own selections. 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
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
