for any person or persons, confined in Town Guard House or otherwise, to cut, break, or in any way mutilate or destroy, the doors. windows or other portions of the Guard House without, whether for escape or otherwise, or to break or destroy any articles of furniture to the rules that apply to Returns made in for use therein, and any person or persons, ers now gratefully proclaim they owe their doing or attempting such cutting, breaking, lives to this New Discovery.
