About Fertilizers.

The following, from an exchange, on consider worthy a place:

Too many of our people use fertilizers indiscriminately. They think that there is some magic about it, just so it is sacked and branded. They should remember that when they buy a sack of guano they get only two or three elements of plant food. If a farm is run down, with little humus in the soil, then it will be necessary to use a perfect manure which will contain nitrogen, phosphoric acid, and potash. 


