The decision of the Supreme Court in the Marlboro Bank case is an important one, settling as it does the law regulating the assessment of property. The gist of the decision is that County boards of equalization fix the value of property in their respective Counties, and that the action of these boards must stand unless there is collusion or fraud. It would appear that this decision virtually settles the case against the railroads, for if the action of the County boards of equalization is final as to other property, then the action of the State Board of Equal ization must be final as to the railroads. If this is correct the assessment . made by that board must stand and the roads must pay their taxes in accordance
