Mr. President and gentlemen of the convention: I can lay my hand upon my heart and truthfully say that there is one time in the history of political conventions...

In accepting the banner that you have entrusted to my keeping, I give you my solemn pledge that when the ideas of November shall have gone, and that banner shall be furled for awhile, there shall not be found a stain upon it...

We present to our fellow Democrats for nomination for State offices by the next Democratic State Convention, or by a direct primary, men who represent no factions...

We demand of the next General Assembly such legislation as will give us a reasonable and equitable system of assessment for taxation...

We denounce the proposition to increase the poll tax to \$3 a year, because it would unjustly put a burden on people not able to bear it...

We oppose and will labor to change the present system of management of the Penitentiary, by which convict labor is used to make cotton in competition with honest farmers and agricultural laborers...

We accept and respect the will of the people as expressed in the election of 1890 as meaning the larger participation and stronger and more direct influence of our agricultural population in the control and management of our public affairs...
