The News and Courier of June 23, gives the following account of the fatal accident to John Craig a negro who was well, and favorably known in Sumter as a laborer and carpenter, up to a few years ago when he went to Charleston:

"A horrible accident occurred yesterday at the coal yard of the Charleston and Savannah Railroad, near Johnson's Bluff, when John Craig, a negro laborer, lost his life. Craig was standing on the elevated 'stage' which surmounts the head of the wharf from where the coal is all the people of the city take the hold of the ship, when he slipped and fell to the deck beneath, the three-masted schooner H. A. Blendersmann, Capt. Peters, which was then at the dock. The distance from the head of the wharf to the deck was about twenty feet. The negro fell head foremost, and the violence of the drop crushed in his skull. The brain was confused, and after a few convulsive movements he lay motionless on the deck. The descent was very quick, and by the time Capt. Peters rushed to where he lay the unfortunate man was dead."
