

There are many crimes against the peace and dignity of the State that a city council does not take cognizance of. For instance a swindler might come to Spartanburg and defrand merchants by buying goods on misrepresentation. No police force would arrest such a man unless they had a warrant properly issued. Slander is a grievous crime, but who ever heard of a mayor causing an arrest for slander? If the qualified voters of a city should ask for a State police, they ought to have it, but not otherwise - Carolina Spartan

Day in and day out, night and day, for 130 When the Confederate government days, the Confederate kept an accurate account of every shot which hit or missed, and made a report of the nature of

the projectile When the war was closed, Fort Sumter was nothing but a huge pile of brick and stone, heaped up as if a great wall had fallen. Underneath the debris was a Confederate garrison with only two cannon, but still strong enough to beat off every attack by small boats. The records of war for a thousand years past cannot furnish another such case. During the seige the flagstaff was shot away 122 times, and eighty men lost their lives in replacing it. Nothing was left of the Fort but the lower bombtwenty-five feet thick Since the war the government has spent a million dollars there, and yet the spot to-day is simply a sand pile, inclosed by a wall ten or twelve feet high, with eight or ten guns in position to command the entrance to the harbor. It was under constant fire over 500 days, and was assaulted again and again, and yet it fell into Federal hands only after Sherman's movements made its evacuation a matter of policy .- Detroit Free Press.
