

SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, will Meet in Sumter, Wednesday, December 6—Notes of Interest—Delegates and Homes Assigned Them.

The South Carolina Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, will assemble in its one hundred and eighth session, in Sumter, S. C., Dec. 6, 1893.

The board of missions, the presiding elders, and the committees of examinations for admission in the travelling connection and for undergraduates of the first, second, third, and fourth years, will convene Tuesday, Dec. 5th.

This conference is remarkable because it is the fourth decennial conference for Sumter. For the last forty years Sumter has had the honor and pleasure of entertaining the Conference every tenth year.

The conference first assembled in Sumter in 1853. Bishop Wm. Capers presided and Rev. Paul A. M. Williams was secretary. At that time the territory of the conference included a considerable part of western North Carolina.

Within the bounds of this conference there were then 33,054 white members, and 40,356 colored members, aggregating 73,410 members. It met here again in 1863 in the dark days of our late civil war.

Bishop Geo. F. Pearce presided and Rev. F. A. Mood was secretary. There were then 39,304 white members, and 42,466 colored members, aggregating 81,770 members. It met here again in 1873.

Bishop H. N. McTyeire presided and Rev. W. C. Power was secretary. The territory formerly within the State of North Carolina held by this conference had been ceded to the North Carolina Conference, which reduced the membership in this conference about 11,000, and thousands more had perished on the field of battle, and in hospitals and prisons.

The war was now over, and as a result it had reduced the colored membership about 49,000. So the minutes of the conference of 1873 show only 36,550 white members and 648 colored members, aggregating 37,198.

The conference met here again in 1883. Bishop A. W. Wilson presided and Rev. W. C. Power was secretary. The minutes of this conference show a white membership of 50,831, an increase of 24,281 white members in ten years.

Dec. 6th 1893 is the next decennial epoch for the conference in Sumter. The minutes will probably show a white membership of about 76,000.

Bishop R. K. Hargrove will preside. He was on the celebrated Cape May commission, which was constituted by the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, to settle the relative status of the two branches of Methodism in the United States and in the mission fields.

He was elected and ordained Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church South at the General Conference that met in Nashville, Tenn., in 1882. At that time he was the handsomest man of the new panel, and perhaps, with exception of Bishop Parker, elected and ordained at the same time, he was the best "all round" ecclesiastic of that number.

His age is between 60 and 65 years. He is well preserved, vigorous in body and mind. He has the grip of a master. His *sauviter in modo, fortiter in re* are among the notable traits of his character. He is a clear reasoner, an able administrative and executive officer, an instructive and impressive speaker. He succeeded Bishop H. N. McTyeire as president of the Board of Trustees of Vanderbilt University, who was the father of that large and flourishing institution. He is secretary of the College of Bishops.

The first Methodist church in this vicinity was built over 100 years ago by Robert Singleton and Richard Bradford. It was situated about 300 yards beyond First Mill about one mile west of the city. The second was built by Thompson Glenn. Wm. L. Brunson was the first recorded class leader and steward of that church. This second building was sold to the Roman Catholic church. The third church was built by Col. Geo. S. D. DesChamps. This edifice was dedicated by Rev. Hartwell Spain. This was such an improvement on all that went before, the eloquent preacher in the course of his sermon called it "This beautiful temple of God." This edifice in turn gave way to the brick structure that now adorns the spot just in the rear of where number three stood. This was planned and mostly built under the pastorate of Rev. H. F. Chreitberg. Mr J. B. Carr was the reliable and efficient master builder.

The Sumterville church was included in the Sumterville circuit embracing a large territory which was composed of 11 local preachers, 2 traveling preachers, 936 white members, 166 colored members, until the close of the year of 1851, when it was set off as a separate charge. Rev. A. M. Forster was appointed preacher-in-charge, and Rev. S. W. Capers (the father of the present pastor) was presiding elder. The charge then had 4 local preachers, 151 white members. This is the 42nd year of the existence of the Sumter station as a separate charge, and during this period it has had 23 pastorate, averaging about 1.8 years to the pastorate. During these years the church was served by A. M. Forster, F. A. Mood, W. H. Fleming, A. G. Stacey, J. A. Porter, R. P. Franks (2 pastorate of 2 years and 1 year respectively), H. D. Moore, D. J. Simmons (2 pastorate of 3 years and 1 year respectively), James Stacy, (who died May 1st 1868 during the 2nd year of his pastorate), H. M. Mood, H. A. C. Walker, J. M. Carlisle, F. Auld, R. N. Wells, A. J. Stokes (2 pastorate of 3 years each), H. F. Chreitberg, M. Brown (whose health failed at the beginning of his pastorate), T. E. Wannamaker, J. M. Pike (whose health failed at beginning of the 2nd year of his pastorate), and E. T. Hodges. Of these, H. T. Chreitberg alone has the distinction of serving the charge 4 years consecutively, and only Simmons, Carlisle, and Stokes, three years each consecutively.

The charge is now about 400 strong and is thoroughly organized into boards and committees and the pastor thinks that while there is much room for improvement in individual cases the church has a set of workers equal to the best he ever served with.

There are three healthy missionary societies, a Dorcas society, committee on the poor, on the sick, and various committees on visitation and on attention to strangers and non-church-goers. There are two prayer meetings, a large Sunday-school, and a useful Ep-

worth League. It is a specialty with the pastor, in addition to his own arduous and arduous labors, to suggest lines of work for as many members of the church as is practicable, and to stimulate them to the most and the best work possible. Though the plan has not accomplished all that was designed for it, yet the measure of success attained fully justifies the effort. The coming conference will meet with one of the most prosperous churches within its jurisdiction, and Sumter, without regard to denominational lines, most heartily welcomes that body of noble men within its limits. The homes of all creeds are opened to them with an unstinted hospitality.

This session of conference will be the largest body of Methodists that has ever assembled in South Carolina. The usual reduced rates will be given over all the railroads to persons attending the conference.

The classes for admission and first and second years will meet in the Y. M. C. A. rooms. The classes of third and fourth years will meet in the lodge room in Masonic Temple.

The regular session of conference will convene Wednesday morning at 9.30, December 6, which will be preceded by the administration of the sacrament of the Lord's supper.

Rev. H. F. Chreitberg has been secretary of the conference, but he was this year transferred to the North Carolina Conference, so Rev. E. O. Watson, assistant secretary, will call the roll.

The election of an editor of the Southern Christian Advocate will be of much interest. Rev. W. D. Kirkland now holds that position. Clerical and lay delegates to the General Conference will also be elected.
