The dispensary system he believed to be worse than the high license system, for the partnership of the State in the evil traffic was closer and more intimate. The dispensary law may be the product of conservative, thinking men, but it will not do, and they will find that they increase an evil instead of diminishing it. Child Fatally Burned.




