The Pudding Swamp tobacco warehouse is a superb and substantial structure of its kind. It is 80 by 125 feet and is lighted by skylights as well as side lights. It was built by Mr. E. J. Daune, of this city, and was put up in less than 25 days. There is an artesian well with a flow of 6 or 7 gallons per minute at one corner of the building that will supply an abundance of pure, cool water for both man and beast.

Speaking of artesian wells, Mayesville has some four or five, and perhaps more, flowing wells that supply water on the streets.


