THE FREE LAW SCHOOL.


Forty-one Students of Blackstone Miss Angel Cheatham. of Edge-Present at the Fourth Lecture Last Night.

The fourth lecture of the Philadelphia Free Law School was delivered in the Burd Building, at Niath and Sansom streets, last night Forty-one men, representing varying ranks of society, were in attendance Albert L. Moise was the lecturer of the evening He is a graduate of the University of Virgicia. a practioner befere the Supreme Courts of that State and South Carolina; bis hour and a half address was of a most instructive character. In a clear-cut and logical manner he spoke, first, of the rights of busband and wife; second, of the relations of parent and child, and third, of the duties of guardian and ward. The basis of his remarks was Dr. Lewis' edition of Blackstone, with special notations upon the Pennsylvania statutes bearing upon the same topics. From his opening seatence he held the attention of the entire class, and his method of questioning the members bad the happy effect of putting them at once upon their mettle, and of bringing out that free discussion which results in the best possible result

Interest in this school, the only one, it is said, in the United States, is growing with esch meeting of the class. The effort of the founders to give anybody a legal education practically free of charge was suggested by a reading of an act, passed in 1682, requiring the laws to be taught in all the schools of the provinces. In the class which last night listened to Professor Moise were civil engineers, typewriters, real estate agents, justices of the peace, clerks in the city office-, journalista and railway employes. Three of the most interested members were a father and his two sons. Professor Moise speaks with a delightful Southern accent, and carefully interprets both the tex:s and annotations

At Friday night's meeting Dr. Herbert Wharton Beall will speak on some of the rights of property as laid down by the great-est of English writers on law.



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
The Declaration of Independence Saved by a Woman.
