Knocked on the Head With a Hammer.

Daniel Jenkins, a negro employed by Mr. T. E. Edens at his gin and cotton press near A barrel of spoilt fish was confiscated by Providence, was knocked in the head last Thursday by Wilie Cooper, another colored

man employed at the same work Both of the men were at work packing cotten and they had co quarrel that any one heard. There were six or eight people around and near by at the time, and strange to say, no one saw the blow giver, or knew that there was any difficulty between the men, both of whom were at work at the press.

When another employe heard the blow and Jenkins fall, he says he thought the press had knocked Jenkins with the hammer because Jenkios started at him with a knife. A physician haspened to be near, and attended the injured man. The extent of his injuries was not known by the person who brought the information to the city, but the blow was on the side of the head just above and back of the ear, and was thought to have been a glancing blow.

Cooper continued on at his work until evening, but has since disappeared. No attempt was made to arrest him, and so far as could be learned at the Sheriff's office no warrant has been issued.

A genileman from Providence who was in the city yesterday said that Daniel Jenkins. had recovered from the effects of the blow on the head with a hammer, and it is now thought that his hort is not serious.

### A SUPPOSED MURDERER CAPTURED 12

A. W. Jones Thought to Be Safe

A negro man was arrested Monday by Chief of Police Bradford, at the request of Mr. C. W. Stansil', on the suspicion that he is A. W. Jones, who is wanted in Wilson, N. C., for the murder of his wife, and for whose arrest a reward of \$200 is offered. The man now in jail fits the description of he does not give a satisfactory account of himself. He claimed at first to have came from North Carolina, but after being placed under arrest he said he came from Dovesville. He gave bis nane as Walter McCrady, but when addressed as Jones answered to the name, apparently acting from impulse. A photograph of him was made yesterday afternoon and forwarded to Wilson, N. C, for identification. In the meanwhile be is securely lodged in the county jail and there he will be kept until he is identified as Jones, or it is established that he is not the man want-




