The warehouse and prize houses will be overhauled and put in thorough repair by the Sumter Tobacco Warehouse Company and the property will be turned over to the lessees in first class condition.

Messrs. Cook and Adams are tobacco warehousemen of many years experience and they will come to Samter with the most satisfactory recommendations from tobacco dealers and banks of Danville, Va., and they have all the capital needed to run the warehouse on a substantial business basis In addition to this they have business connections with the largest tobacco manufacturers and exporters of Virginia and North Carolina which guarantees the success and permanency of the warehouse under their management. They have already arranged for a corps of buyers to be stationed here, and the market will not be left to the tender mercies of speculators and pin-hookers, whose sole object is to make all the money possible out of the farmers by buying their tobacco at low prices and reselling it on other markets. There will be not less than six or eight regular buyers for the American Tobacco Co, and other manufacturers and exporters, and this number may be increased before the season opens, as Messrs. Cook & Adams have been at work only a short time and have not completed their arrangements with all of the tobacco firms they wish to induce to station buyers in this city. The outlook for the tobacco market is decidedly encouraging and all that is needed to make it the success it should be is the co-operation and encouragement of the tobacco planters and the business men of this city.
