Georgia Style is Shown al Griffin-Got as "Tired" as the War Department Itself.

Atlanta, Ga., March 8 .- The Teath immunes, Col. Jones, who were to show their ill temper as soon as the train bearing the negroes home began to move out of Macon. Procatting revolvers and other arms which they in some way managed to inggie with them they began firing from the windows. Bullets flew in every direction as the train sped on and passensby were compelled to seel anelter. Luckily only one per-son was shot in Macon, Will Good-you, a 16 year old white boy whose arm was bedly fractured by a ball. As the train passed the various stations on the road the rioting was renewed, shots being fired from the trail at the people standing on the pistlorms to see the train go by. At Griffin, Ga, where the first section of the train stopped about 2.30 this alternoon, occurred the most serious trouble of the day. The regiment came over the Central of Georgia railroad in three sections When the first train stopped at Griffin the negroes, who by this time had filled up on whiskey, began firing their pistois and yelling like Indians Over 200 shots were ared and the police were powerless to resist. 


Seems to be No Ground for How Charleston Entertained the Rumor of Deweys Ill



Washingtan, March 9 .- When his attention was called to the statement coming from Vancouver to the effect that Admiral Dewey is breaking down and cannot last a month longer, Secretary Long said that he had no information whatever on this point The stories of the admiral's ill bealth have been in circulation with more or less persistency for the past four months They are all traceable to private reports, and though officers of the navy who have returned from Mamila state that Dewey's healt, so far as it could be gauged from his ppearance, appears to left Macon yesterday afternoon, not be about the same as it has been for the past few years, they agree that the private reports probably have a fair basis of fact.

> It is not denied by these officers that the admiral has aged in appearance notably within the past year ; his hair physically. Meantime he has had imposed upon him the most severe and active duties, so it is but natural that his frail physique should show the effect of the tremendous strain. It is said by porsons familiar with the Philippine climate that the second year is the hardest to bear for a Caucasian, and Dewey soon will begin his second year there. 
