Mr. Morris, a member of the Georgia Legislature, it is reported, will introduce a bill relative to lynchings at the next session of that body. The bill no very briefly outlined "will provide for the trial of the accused within five days after his arrest and, upon conviction, for his hanging in public five days later."

"A unique provision of the bill," it is added, "is that the testimony of the assailant's victim may be taken in prirate by a special commission, in the presence of the ascused, while the trial

is in progress " The measure, as appears from the unique provision, relates only to persons accused of rape, and the most that need be said about it, perhaps, is that it is plain that some such mode of dealing with them by the Courts must be adopted, if they are to be tried by Courts and hanged by an officer of the law. Bradstreet's Weekly Report

CHGAR STAMPS. Both Wholesale and Retail Business Above the Average.

> New York, May 5 - Bradstreet's tomorrow will say: That this is, in deed an era of trade and industrial combinations seems evident from the long list of announcements of new consolidations, rumored or actual'y floated, coming to public view this week. Whether this tendency has as yet reached its culmination cannot, of course, be easily predicted, but in some lines of industry the announcements of projected consolidations would seem to have left little room for further operations of this kind. Easily first in this direction is the gigantic iron and steel combi nation, announced with seeming confidence as in process of formation Second only to this, however, is the actual floating of the great copper combination. Outgrowths of these great combinations are of immense industrial changes in many lines; they possess a special interest in the world of trade and finance because of the immense aggregations of capital or industry involved in their projection or their carrying out to a successful finish While wholesale trade continues of

a between seasons volume, very gen-

eral evidence is forthcoming that the aggregate is in excess of last year's undeniably good proportions, and retail demand is of an encouraging character That the volume of fall business booked is in excess of the average, is very generally conceded. Advances in prices and reported great activity abroad point to the widespread demand for iron and steel and render less doubtful the hold of American products on foreign markets The tone of general values is notably strong for the season of the year, a prominent exception being pork and hog products generally which have been the subject of bearish manipulation Cereals are gen erally firm, cash wheat being frac tionally higher at the seaboard on interruption to movement by the wa ter route, cause by the grain handlers' strike at Buffalo, while option business is in a waiting stage, pending the government report on wheat condition and acreage next weeek. Crop advices are contradictory, but good weather seemed for successful planting and growth of spring wheat, while foreign crop advices continue to the wants of customers. good, and export demand is of only moderate proportions, This, coupled with smaller than expected decreases in world's supplies reported to Bradstreet's this week, acts as a check to values which might otherwise record the admitted damage to the winter wheat crop

Copper among the metals, retains all its strength, speculative interest in copper consolidation being a sus taining feature, offsetting depressing effects on consumptive demand of the recent advance. A special feature this week is the activity in building and in real estate reported from a number of widely saparated points, material generally are consequently firm or tending upward. In textiles, raw cotton is rather weaker on improving weather and the crop conditions, but manufactured goods are very firm, and some brown and bleached export grades have been advanced Wool markets note a change in the buying of some large lots of domestic wools for speculation, and prices are firm in sympathy with the advanced quo tations paid for some large lots of Australian bonded wool brought for

The British Government Has Sent an Ultimatum.

Cape Town, May 5 .- The reply of President Kruger to the British de mand for the cancellation of the dynamite concession contends that that the concession is bona fide and constitutes no breach of the London convention. He says that the amend ment to the concession asked by the Brisish government will be a breach of faith in regard to other parties

London, May 5-The Outlook publishes a special from its Cape Town correspondent which states that the British secretary of state for the colonies, Chamberlain, has dispatched a firmly worded demand to the Trans. vaal government that it must observe its obligations to the queen as the paramount power by secureing peace and order within there public. This demand supplementary to demand for the cancellation of the dynamite con cession and is taken to mean that the British government deems that the time has come to invite President Kruger to observe the letter as well as the spirit of the London convention It is not stated how far the demand takes the form of an ultimatum or if a period is fixed within which the re dress of the grievances of the Outlanders shall be made.

THE CUBAN SUPREME COURT.

Havana, May 4 - Governor General Brooke has signed the commissions of the President and Associate Justices of the recently constituted Supreme Court of Cuba The tribunal, as now made up, consists of Senor Antonio Gonzales de Mendoza President, and Senores Pedro Genza les Llorente, Jose Garcia Montos, Luis Esteves Romero, Uduldo Tamayo, Angel Betancour and Rafael Cruz Porez, Associates.

Senor Federco Mora, who has held the post of Civil governor of Habana, is appointed Attorney General. with Senors Octavio Giberga and Carlos Revila as his assistants. All the Justices are well known jurists, men of untarnished reputation, and possessed of wealth enough to place them beyond temptation to abuse their trust. More than this, the selections satisfy legitimate political considerations, the four principal provinces being represented in the tribunal-Havana by Senor Llorente, Santiago by Senor Tamayo, who was formerly an associate Justice of the Provincial Supreme Court, a post he resigned to become Gen. Wood's chief Cuban adviser, Puerto Principe by Senor Betancourt, and Matanzas by Senor Porez The other members of the tribunal are Havana men.

The Court, at 5 p. m , proceeded to the examination of the applicants for admission to the Bar who present ed themselves and were examined on witten questions.


