DID BOERS GET THE GUNS?

London, Dec 20 .- It still seems doubtful whether the guns that Gen Buller abandoned at Colenso are in the possession of the Boers. According to a dispatch to The Associated Press from Darban sent off on the evening of the battle, and which has just been received here, the guns remained where they were left by the British troops and were covered by the heavy guns of Gon Hildyara's brigade, occupying an entrenched position. 

AT SAN METEO.

SHOT WHILE WALKING ALONG FIRING LINE BEFORE CHARGE.

Gen Lawton Marched by Night From Manila to Drive Gen Geronimo From Strong Position at San Meteo.

W. Lawton has been shot and killed, at San Mateo. He was standing in front of his troops, was shot in the breast and died immediately

the season. A terrific rain had begun and is still continuing.

Accompanied by his staff and Troop I. Fourth cavalry, Gen Lawton set out at 9 o'clock in advance of the main force, consisting of the Eleventh cavalry and one battalion each of the Twentieth and Twenty-seventh infantry, which started from La Loma at mid aight. With a small escort, he led the way through an almost pathless country, a distance of 15 miles, over hills and through canebrake and deep mud. the horses climbing the rocks and sliding down the hills. Before daybreak the command had reached the head of the valley.

San Mateo was attacked at 8 o'clock and a three hours' fight ensued. This resulted in but few casualties on the American side, apart from the death of Gen Lawton, but the attack was difficult because of the natural defenses of the town. Gen Lawton was walking along the firing line within 300 yards of a small sharpshooter's trench, conspicuous in the big white bemlet he wore and a light yellow rain coat. He was also easily distinguishable because of his commanding stature.

The sharpshooters directed several close shots, which clipped the grass near. His staff officers called Gen Lawton's attention to the danger he was in, but he only laughed with his usual contempt for builets

Suddenly he exclaimed : "I am shot." clenched his hands in a desperate effort to stand erect, and fell into the arms of a staff officer.

Orderlies rushed across the field for surgeons, who dashed up immediately, but their efforts were useless. The body was taken up to a clump of bushes and laid upon a stretcher, the familiar white helmet covering the face of the dead general
