Postage Rates Reduced.

An order has been received at the postoffice announcing that after the first day of April the domestic posiage rates of the United States shall apply to all matter passing be-

tween the United States and Cuba. The order, issued by Charles Emory Smith, postmaster general, is a very important, one, as it materially reduces the rates and changes the classifications of all matter intended for the island. The domestic rates in the United States on letters and all first-class matter is 2 cents for each half ounce. This rate will now apply to letters addressed to any part of Cuos. All other domestic classifications and

rates are made to apply to Cuba also. The order was issued in Washington a few days ago, but did not take effect until the first of the month.

Sewerage and Sewage.

Of all the communications received concerning the question of sewerage for our city, we venture that the following is more to the point and contains more information than any yet received To those of our citizens who have been fearing the debt of untold thousands in bonds to be paid by an unborn posterity, this letter should bring a sudden and effectual relief of mind. We commend the letter to our readers It was received today by one of the committee of five, who are still trying to find facts for the people:

Fredericksburg, Va . Aprill 11 Dear Sirs:-Yours of the 8th tostant is before me and I take pleasure in giving you some preliminary information

In the first place I presume you will use the separate system, which is a system of small pipe sewers designed to carry only sewerage, while the surface or "storm water" son were married last Thursday evening at is cared for in an independent or separate the residence of Mr. and Mrs L I. Parrott, manner This is the universal practice ex cept in the larger cities that are closely built up, then they use the "combined" system, the 'storm-water' and the sewage being cared for in very large and expensive sewers and your citizens who think that your system will cost \$75,000 must have been thinking of storm-water sewers

I built 113 miles of sanitary sewers in Aiken, S. C, at a cost of \$27,000, and this included the construction of six filter beds for the disposal of the sewage by "intermit tent downward filtration" since local conditions prevented us from emptying the raw sewage into the branch

If you can dispose of your sewage by continuous outfall into some bold stream then 12 miles of sanitary sewers with sizes of pipes from 18 to 8 inches, will not cost over \$25,000, unless some local conditions create unusual difficulties in the construction. The work that I am at present engaged uponbuilding the Fredericksburg, Va, sewershas some rough work in one section which causes a variation in price for laying 15-inch pipe of 10 cents per foot and the 20-tuch pipe is laid along a tidal stream and the work is in a wet ditch, which makes the price for 20inch pipe here rather high. The prices on this work are as follows:

20-iach pipe in place, \$1 00 per foot 18 inch " .75 " 15-inch " " " .50 11 11 10-inch (bad work in water) 30 44 8-inch 6 inch house connections 21 " About 15 man-holes per mile cost average

\$25,00. About 10 flush tanks in all cost \$10 each These are figures from a contract now being executed and will give you a correct idea

Of course nothing more definite can be given without a close study of your require ments and of all local conditions after making careful surveys of the entire drainage area to be sewered. Taking an average of a large number of

systems that I have built, where no rock is encountered, I find the cost per mile will not exceed \$2200, and if there is a large proportion of 10 inch and 8-inch pipe used the cost per mile will drop below \$2000. I will ask you to give me a little more

information before I could name a price for making surveys, plan-, report and estimate of cost of constructing a system best suited to your needs, but I will say that it will not cost over \$500

The work necessary to give you the proper information and put you in a position to advertise for bids will be about as follows: 1. To make a careful topographical survey

of the town 2 To design for you the best system under the conditions as I find them, all conditions

3 To draw plans showing the sizes of pipe required, their location on the streets and the depths of cut necessary to lay the pipes on the proper grade so that one part of the system will surely join to and proper'y co-operate with all other parts.

4 To make a report to the committee describing the details of the system with an estimate of its cost

5. To draw a set of specifications and form of contract that shall fully describe the work to contractors so that they can give close and totelligent bids and so that the town's interest will be fully protected If you will kindly let me know at what time you will want this work done so that I will know that it does not interfere with my present engagements I will name you a definite figure for the engineering work in connection with the design of your proposed system and also for the superintendence of construction when the contract is let.

I will come to Sumter at my own expense to look over the ground and make you a proposition to act as your engineer as soon as you are ready to go shead with this work, and I beg that you give me opportunity to submit my proposition before you compromise yourself with other parties who may apply for your work.

If the information enclosed is not all you want at present let me know and I will gladly give you say further pointers that I can. Will you advise of the state of offairs in connection with this matter? Have you decided to build, or is the question just

FRASER, WALLACE AND WITH-ERSPOON.

Resolutions Adopted in Court on Saturday.

On Saturday, just prior to the adjourn ment of the Court of Common Pleas, Gen. E W. Moise introduced resolutions of respect to the memory of Judges Fraser, Wallace and Witherspoon, which were adopted and ordered spread on the records, after which the Court adjourned Gen. Moise, Maj. W. F. B Hayneworth and Mr R O. Purdy made brief speeches, paying tributes to the memory of the late judges. Judge Watts, also, paid a tribute to Fraser, Wallace and Witherspoon. The resolutions were

as follows: Whereas, it has pleased Almighty God to remove from our midst three of the Judges who have heretofore imparted tone character and dignity to the Bench of South Carolina; And, Whereas, it is meet and proper that this Court should take Judicial cognizance

of these sad and deplorable events, Be it therefore, Resolved, That in the deaths of Judges Fraser, Wailace and With erspoon the State of South Carolina has suf fered irreparable loss and the cause of admin istrative justice has been deprived of its most

loyal and compesent officers Second, Resolved that the Bar of the State and of this County must feel it to be a privilege to record their due appreciation of the judicial services of such man and their sincere admiration of their purity, virtue and

Third, Resolved that in the solemn judg-Wallace and Witherspoon fully and truthfully represented the judicial standard which has made the Benca of South Carolina famous for its integrity and ability, its fairness and its legal lore

Foorth, Resolved that in evidence of its respect to their memory this Court do now adjourn and that the Cierk he instructed to inscribe these resolutions on the minutes and that he be required to furnish a copy thereof to the families of the deceased Judges under the seal of this Court.
