The Lee County Case.

Columbia, Aug. 12.—The following was handed in at the Bureau today: In The News and Courier of the 9th instant appears a letter from Lynchburg, Lee County, in which is the following statement:

"It is a pity that the Supreme Court cannot or will not decide the question as to the validity of the election of Lee County before the trouble and expense of a campaign have been gone through. Once before it has happened that this county had an election, and after all the work of an election and transferring of records had been completed the election was declared illegal."

The records in the Supreme Court show:

1. That a petition for injunction to restrain the orgnization of Lee County was filed in this Court on the 3d day of June, the day before the Court took a recess until the fourth Monday, November 24 next, unless sooner convened by proper authority.

2. An order thereupon issued requiring the commissioners of Lee County to show cause why the injunction should not issue.

3. On June 25 the return of the commissioners, together with some affidavits, was filed.

No other papers relating to the case have been filed in the office of the clerk of the Supreme Court. Nothing further has been done by the attorneys on either side, so far as the records of the Supreme Court show, to bring the case to a hearing.
