After Conviction of One Murder he Confesses to Four Others.

Columbus, Aug. 19.—Alfred A. Knapp, convicted of the murder of his wife, Hannah Goddard Knapp, his wife, Eannah Goddard Knapp, and who confessed to five murders, was electrocuted in the annex of the Ohio penitentiary a few minutes after midnight. Please notify all applicants for teachers' certificates in ample time so that there may be no misunderstanding as to the date.

The State board of education will hold its regular meeting on Friday, Septembper 2, at 5 o'clock p. m. All matters claiming the attention of this board should be in this office by September 1st.

> Statesboro, Ga., Aug. 16.—With clothing saturated with kerosene, writhing and twisting in their agony, screaming to heaven for the mercy that the mob would not show, Paul Reed and Will Cato, negroes, two of the principals in the dastardly murder and burning of Henry Hodges and wife and three children, six miles from Statesboro three weeks ago, were burned at the stake today.
