Resignation of the Judge of the Third Circuit Effective September 1.

Laurens, Jan. 15.—Judge R. O. Purdy, of Sumter, who is presiding over the January term of court here, today forwarded to Gov. Ansel his resignation as judge of the third judicial circuit of South Carolina, effective September 1. Judge Purdy is very popular in Laurens and the bar unitedly express regret over his decision to retire from the position which he has filled with eminent ability for five years, having been re-elected for his second term last winter.
