Stateburg, Jan. 20.—Mr. Washington Allen died at his home in Stateburg township on the 9th of Jan. 1909.

Mr. Allen was one of the oldest men in his immediate section, being 87 years and five months old. He was widely known and highly respected. He leaves a wife and six children to mourn his loss. 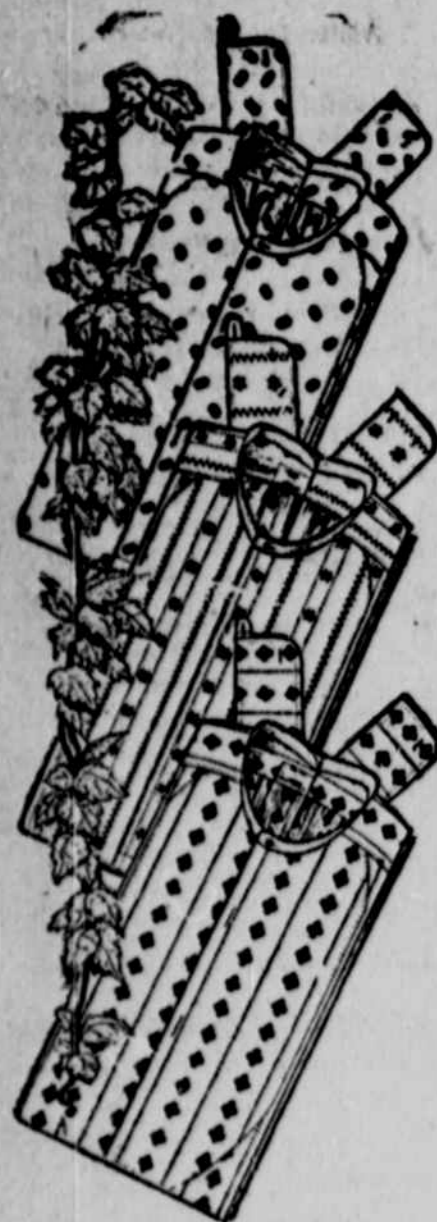
