NET INCREASE OF \$155,000.

Board of Assessors Have About Completed Their Work.

The township board of assessors have about completed their canvas of the property in this township and have made a net increase of \$155,000 in the tax value. They made an increase of \$211,000 and a decrease of \$56,000. There were about 135 different individuals who had their returns too high. Their work was to put all on the same footing. This they have done as best they could.

This net increase means that there has been but about 1-3 per cent. increase in the property of the township, or about 4 per cent of the tax value. This does not amount to a great deal, but it will help in the long run. It also serves to make every man carry his share of the burden of the city.

Hon. A. K. Sanders is prominently spoken of as a candidate for the senate. He has not announced himself, but it is generally understood that he will make the race.

Two negroes were up before the Recorder this morning for riding bicycles on the sidewalk on Oakland Ave. They were Joseph Rhame and Willie Johnson. Each contributed \$1 to the paving fund.

At the recent meeting of Game Cock Building and Loan Association Mr. R. K. Wilder was made president to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Dr. A. J. China, and Mr. A. J. Stubbs was made a director.

The committee from the Y. M. C. A. met Monday night and canvassed situation and assessed every man what they thought would be his part in the building for the Association. No man had placed upon him more than he can stand, nor more than is his just part. When the campaign is begun every man must do his part—subscribe all that is expected of him. If any fall down that means that much of the fund will have to be taken, for there is no one to take the place of any who reing. This is a fight for the community, and every man must do his part.
