**TEACHER WINS CASE.**

**Miss Pauline Jones Secures Verdict in Suit Against School District.**

A case of considerable interest in the Magistrate's Court Tuesday was that of Miss Pauline Jones against Mayesville School District No. 15. The suit was to recover from the district sixty dollars alleged to be due on Miss Jones' salary during 1910-11 school session. The jury after being out only a few minutes returned a verdict in favor of Miss Jones.

It seems from the testimony adduced at the hearing of the case that Miss Jones had been promised thirty dollars a month from the school by two of the trustees, while the third trustee understood she was to get twenty dollars a month. Miss Jones accepted twenty dollars each month from the district for teaching, but afterwards put in her claim for the other sixty dollars, which she alleged was due her. This claim was refused by the chairman of the board and suit was brought.

Mr. L. D. Jennings represented the plaintiff and Mr. J. H. Clifton the defendant.

**BICYCLE THIEF ARRESTED.**

**Sidney Bradley Arrested on Charge of Taking Bicycles.**

Wednesday afternoon Deputy Sheriff John Epperson and Rural Policeman A. M. Bateman arrested Sidney Bradley, colored, who is accused of having stolen several bicycles from persons around town. Bradley was arrested in a swamp on the Tindal road where he was cutting timber and has been lodged in jail.

The clue to the thief was secured by Mr. H. L. Tisdale from whom Bradley was alleged to have taken a wheel. Mr. Tisdale recognized the wheel when it was brought to his shop for repairs and tracked it when it went away to near Mr. A. J. Jones' place. Here he secured the assistance of the deputy sheriff and rural policeman and the negro was found and arrested. One of the wheels was recovered and information was given which will probably lead to the recovery of two more wheels.
