MARKET LOW GRADE CORN.


Columbia, Jan. 24.—Commissioner Watson of the department of agfiriculture, in view of the many cases that have arisen in the past few days, wishes to warn all merchants in this State against the purchase of Western corn. In the past few days shipments have been found in the markets of Columbia and elsewhere and have been taken off the markets by the inspectors.

At Clio yesterday a shipment of 500 bushels of fourth grade corn was' found, and while it was not seized, it was tied up until the original shippers requested it reshipped to a point beyond the borders of the State of South Carolina.

The law in this State does not permit fourth grade corn to be sold in the State. The commissioner wishes especially to urge that all purchases of corn during this season be made strictly subject to State inspection. He says that if the merchants in South Carolina will make this stipulation, inspectors will be promptly sent and the goods will be promptly arrested, and there can be no danger then of any merchant losing anything by reason of the bad quality of corn that is being shipped this year.

Death of J. W. McLeod.

Manning, Jan. 23 .- J. W. McLeod, one of the oldest and most prominent citizens of this community, died at his home near Manning at an early hour this morning, uged about 67 years. Mr. McLeod had been physically infirm for several years, and on several occasions it seemed that he would hardly be able to rally, but each time he improved and was able to be out and about more or less. He was a native of Clarendon county and spent all his life here, being engaged most of the time as a farmer, but was for several years interested also in mer-f cantile business and as a cotton buyer. He accumulated a considerable estate, consisting mainly of town and country property. He was for many years a devoted member of the Methodist church and was a liberal supporter of the church's benevolent, causes, especially the Epworth orphanage at Columbia. He is survived by one son, J. Lawson McLeod, and


