BOLL WREVIL ON THE WAY.

Cotton Pest Prevalent in 36 Georgia Countles.

Atlanta, Sept. 2.—The boll weevil s now prevalent in 36 Georgia counties, and in 81 counties in the southern part of the State the weevil and the floods of the summer have caused damage to cotton ranging from 40 to 60 per cent, of the total crop, according to a statement made here today by E. Lee Worsham, State entomologist. Cauthen, W. D. McLeod; J. F.
