lighting system. In each class room all of the light comes into the room from one side, so th he teachers may arrange the desks so that the light comes over the left shoulder of the students, an end much desired in schools. All of the lights in the building are controlled from the superintendent's office, or, as one of the pupils jestingly remarked, "all of the switches were in the superintend-

ent's office." A inter-communicating telephone system with the switchboard in the principal's office is a convenience not installed in the other schools. By means of the telephone communication can be had from any room with the principal's office or with other class rooms at any time. An automatic adjustment keeps the heat in the rooms and building at any

temperature desired. A hot air system is employed in providing heat for the building. As already stated, the building was practically completed last spring, but the finishing touches were put on later.
