Archangel, Sept. 30 .- (By the Associated Press.)-American, British Russian and French troops today occupy villages on both banks of the Dvina river to a point 125 miles north of Kotlas, in the government of Vologda. They have advanced seventy-five miles in the last two weeks and now are about 375 miles southeast of Archangel. The river is blocked further south by Bolsheviki mines and barges, which have been sunk in the channel.


