Paris Making a Vast Fete Over Coming of President Wilson.

ENTRY INTO CITY MADE AT TEN O'CLOCK

President of the United States Welcomed By President of France and High Officials.

Paris, Dec. 11.—President Wilson made his entry into Paris at 10:15 this morning, his arrival being greeted by a salvo of artillery in salute. Huge crowds were massed about the Bois de Boulogne station and as President Wilson alighted at the rear a cheer went up that left no doubt as to the cordiality of the welcome to the city's latest guest.

The president was greeted by President and Madame Poincare, Premier Clemenceau and other high officials. He entered the carriage with President Poincare while Mrs. Wilson, Miss Margaret Wilson and Mrs. Poincare followed in another carriage. The party drove to the residence of Prince Murat, where the Wilsons will reside while in the capital. The entire route was lined with French troops in solid array.

The city is making a vast fete over President Wilson's coming.

Resignation of Brand Committee Completes the Work.

SEN. SMITH'S VIEWS ON THE COTTON SITUATION

Says Outlook Brighter Than at Any Time Since War Between States.

Washington, Dec. 13.—Senator E. D. Smith was this afternoon informed by Chairman Branch of the war industries board that the resignation of the brand committee on cotton distribution had been accepted. This completes what Senator Smith had been saying on Mr. Branch the removal of all governmental restrictions on the cotton trade in this country that would enter into effect because of the war. The price-fixing committee, came to an end a week or more ago.

As to the export situation, Gen. Goethals today informed the secretary of war that the army could release to the shipping board 100 vessels for use in the export trade, and it is understood that the shipping board will allocate about one-fourth of these to the cotton trade.

"I consider the outlook based on supply and demand brighter for higher prices for cotton than it has been since the civil war," said Senator Smith tonight. "The world, with Germany and her allies, climaxed, is consuming fourteen and a half million bales of American cotton.

"When peace is declared and the army's surplus is opened to cotton, it will provide a market for some \$200,000,000 in sales additional. About 200,000 tons of shipping have been released for export trade. There will probably be a demand for 15,000,000 or 16,000,000 bales of American cotton, with the supply hardly adequate to meet it."

President Wilson Goes to Church Twice on Sabbath Day.

VISITS LAFAYETTE'S TOMB AFTERWARDS

Residents of French Capital Turn Out En Masse in Effort to Get Glimpse of American Executive.

Paris, Dec. 15.—President Wilson spent his first Sunday in Paris by going twice to church, having a wreath on the tomb of Lafayette and making a brief conference with President Poincare and another with Col. L. M. House. In the evening he attended in preparation for the coming dramatic week of preliminary conferences.

During the afternoon the president made a short call on President and Madame Poincare at the Palace of the Elisee.

In the morning the president, accompanied by Mrs. Wilson and Admiral Gaxotte and by several service men, went to the American Presbyterian Church in the Rue de Berri. His coming was known to only a few of the American colony who had guessed that the president, being a consistent church-goer, would choose a church of his own denomination.

The Rev. Chauncey W. Goodrich, the pastor, took his text from the ninth verse of the ninth chapter of Isaiah. He dwelt on the necessity of suppressing political and civil life with idealism and showed how the situation of humanity was reaching the last stage in the constitution of a society of nations. The office was filled, but there was no special service. The president took part as he would if he had been at the Central Presbyterian Church in Washington.

In the afternoon President Wilson went to a church of his own denomination in the center in Washington. The church was the American Episcopal Church of the Holy Trinity, the parish of South Carolina, the Rev. W. A. Gerry, officiating.

The president visited the tomb of Lafayette in the Bois de Boulogne in the morning. He was accompanied by Mrs. Wilson, Admiral Gaxotte and Col. House. The president placed the wreath on the tomb before he heard the firing of the famous 75-caliber gun which helped America in her fight for liberty. He made no speech whatsoever. He then returned to the Murat residence.

In the meantime, all the residents of Paris apparently had turned out in the hope of getting a glimpse of the president. It was reported that the Wilsons had just returned, for the sun broke through the murky clouds for the first time in days and began to dry up the muddy streets. The sun lit up the city in all its but-terfly banners and flags.

To a foreign observer it appeared that everyone in Paris was on the boulevards. There was no space anywhere on the sidewalks. A great crowd gathered in the Place de la Concorde. The heads of the American mission, the crowd framed about the doors and took keen interest in every American passing in or out. The most conspicuous attack, carrying a case of official papers, was surrounded and carefully inspected by admiring Frenchmen and women.

TELLS OF AMERICAN SYMPATHY FOR FRANCE

United States Entered War Because the People Realized That Great Wrongs Must Be Resisted by Lovers of Liberty

Paris, Dec. 16.—President Wilson delivered an address today at the city hall, where ceremonies were arranged to honor his visit.

Replying to the greeting extended to him, he said "It is with no ordinary sympathy that the people of the United States, for whom I have the privilege of speaking, have viewed the sufferings of the people of France. We were more deeply moved by the wrongs of war because we knew the manner in which they were perpetrated. When the United States entered war therefore, they were moved by the conviction that the purposes of the central emperor were wrong and must be resisted by men everywhere who loved liberty and right and because of the illicit ambitions they were entertaining and attempting to realize. Our resolution was formed because we know how profoundly great principles were affected, but our hearts moved also with our resolution."
