## Board Announces New Text Books

### To Be Used for Next Five-Year Period—List of Books Dropped and Those Not Bid for Re-adoption Given

Columbia, May 24.—The recent adoption of text books by the State Board of Education contains 155 titles for the next five-year period, as compared to 143 titles used during the present period, according to a statement given out today by John E. Swearingen, state superintendent of education. The statement follows:

"The list of text books adopted by the State Board of Education for the five-year period, July 1, 1922, to July 1, 1927, includes 155 titles. This list supersedes the adoption of 1917, which contained 143 titles. Eighty-three of the former titles were re-adopted, thirty-one were dropped by the state board and thirty-four were not offered by the publishers. The new list contains forty-seven additional titles in order to meet the requirements of a broadened, enriched and liberalized course of study. No pupil should be expected or required to purchase all these books. Discriminating teachers are advised to require not more than five books at a time during any one year. The opportunity for reading, however, has been greatly improved by offering a number of supplementary texts, and it is hoped that pupils will be encouraged to read as much as possible.

"All old books may continue in class room use for the next eighteen months, up to January 1, 1924. Pupils, therefore, will have a year and a half in which to finish the texts now in their possession. The introduction of new books should be a gradual process. "In some instances, books were offered the board at an increase of more than 50 per cent in price. For the new adoption as a whole, the increase is about 40 per cent, although scattered titles had to be retained at double their former cost."

## MILLION-DOLLAR MILL FOR YORK

### Stockholders of Hawthorn Mills Back of Enterprise

York, May 25.—Stockholders of the Hawthorn Spinning Mills will build a 20,000 spindle mill at Clover, York county, construction work to begin immediately, according to announcement this afternoon by John R. Hart of York, attorney for the Hawthorn Mills, most of whose stockholders are residents of Massachusetts. The new spinning mill will be capitalized at \$1,000,000. Thos. McConnell of Northampton, Mass., president of the company is here. Plans for the new mill which will be a two-story structure are being drawn by J. E. Sirmine, mill architect of Greenville. Seventy acres, adjoining the present Hawthorn Mill at Clover, have been bought by the company from R. M. Robinson's estate. Numbers of textile men of Massachusetts are making plans to build new plants South, according to Mr. Hart, who has just returned from Massachusetts and New York, where he conferred with leading mill men, since they are realizing that they can no longer successfully compete with Southern spinning mills by remaining in their present locations under existing conditions.
