

Scaley-Leg Mites of Chicks Clemson College, June 28-The mite commonly remains on the feet burrowing through the scales and causing their enlargement. A crust of loose tissue is formed above the burrows, and intense itching results. When scalv leg is left untreated, the feet often becomes badly distorted, and in some cases the fowls can scarcely walk or get up to the perch. Controlling scalyleg is by soaking the legs in warm soapy water to loosen the scales, and then applying kerosene oil on the leg with care not to get it on the feathers. Treatment should be immediate when the disease is discovered.
