board Air Line, in its protest against physical pools in business and boycotts, was not sincere and has been guilty of improper conduct will not serve any useful purpose. It is true that the Seaboard Air Line, after having resisted the Southern Railway and Steamship Association, and succeeded in having it dissolved, joined with the railroads in an effort to organize the Southern States Freight Association, with the hope that a legitimate association which would subserve useful ends might be formed. This association agreement contained certain clauses of which the Seaboard Air Line did not approve, but it went in with the hope that as it had succeeded in doing away with the old Southern Railway and Steamship Association it would succeed, by a like process, in eliminating the influence of the Southern Railway Company in the Southern States Freight Association disappointed that hope, and that it would be unable to accomplish its ends; it, therefore, politely withdrew. It did not feel called upon to assign all of its reasons for so doing. It is sufficient that it could no longer remain with the Association. That it was not wrong in its estimate of the domination of the Southern Railway is proven by the fact that at the meeting of the Southern States Freight Association at which the 80 per cent cut was adopted Mr. T. K. Scott, general manager of the Georgia Railroad, who held two votes—one for the Georgia Railroad and one as proxy for Mr. Averill, receiver of the Port Royal and Augusta Railway, and who strongly and vigorously opposed the inauguration of this 80 per cent cut in committee—absented himself from the meeting of the Association which adopted said cut, and thus avoided voting against it, although he knew that his negative vote, under the rules of the Association, would have prevented the inauguration of the cut, which he so much deplored.

These are but a few of the interesting matters discussed by Mr. St. John. His letter is liberally brimming with statements and facts and facts which will well repay reflection by every railroad man, business man and merchant in the South.—Charleston News and Courier.
