**SOUTH CAROLINA'S CLAIMS.**  
Tillman's Bill For Their Payment Passes the Senate.  
WASHINGTON, June 7.—Senator Tillman has had a hard fight all along the line in his efforts to get an adjustment of the claims of the state against the United States for money expended by the state during the war of 1812 and the Florida war of 1830. Strong opposition was manifested in the committee on appropriations to the amendment offered by the senator to the sundry civil bill, but he finally succeeded in having the amendment reported by the committee. When the amendment was considered in the senate it was the subject of much debate, and rejected, but the senator asked for a reconsideration, and after two hours of debate, the amendment was passed. The house, however, refused to accept the action of the senate on this item, and the amendment was defeated in conference. Senator Tillman, anticipating this action, had previously introduced a bill in the senate providing for a settlement of these claims against the government. He called it up, and after debate, the bill was passed by the senate.

**WHOLESALE JAIL DELIVERY.**  
Every Prisoner in Laurens County Escapes—Still at Large.  
LAURENS, S. C., June 11.—Every prisoner in the county jail has made his escape. There were six negroes in the jail and the ringleader in the delivery is supposed to have been John Coleman, who two months ago, while working on the chain gang, knocked the guard senseless, took his rifle and fled and then dangerously wounded a citizen in the posse who effected his capture. It was thought Coleman's wounds would prove fatal. Two iron bars in his cell door were cut through with a knife, bars broken out the window and a ladder made of blankets, by which the men let themselves out. Coleman invited the others to join him. None have been captured.

**DEPEW TO AID CHARLESTON.**  
He is Interested in Two Projects to Help That City.  
CHARLESTON, June 7.—Charleston has interested Senator Depew in two projects the city is mostly deeply interested in—a government appropriation of \$250,000 for the South Carolina Interstate and West Indian exposition and the removal of the naval station and drydock from Port Royal to this city. Senator Depew had previously established friendly relations with prominent Charlestonians and has been dubbed South Carolina's "other senator." The New York senator visited the "City by the Sea" on the occasion of the reception given the Gridiron club, which was an occasion peculiarly fitted to the forming of "friendly relations."

**KILLING NEAR GREENVILLE.**  
John McTindall Shoots His Uncle—Result of Family Feud.  
GREENVILLE, S. C., June 11.—John McTindall, who lives in the Bushy creek section of Anderson county, about 7 miles from here, shot and almost instantly killed his uncle, James W. Roper, in a road near McTindall's store. The contents of a double-barrel shotgun taking effect in the chest and abdomen. Trouble has existed in the family for a long time. McTindall claims self defense, alleging that Roper was advancing on him with a knife at the time he fired the fatal shot.

**Editor Deserts His Family.**  
COLUMBIA, S. C., June 8.—Mrs. C. B. Brooks is endeavoring to discover the whereabouts of her husband, who was editor of the *Gallop*, N. C., *Nieter*. Mrs. Brooks was originally from Clinton, where her mother lives. From some time ago Mrs. Blanton, Brooks' sister-in-law, with her two children, to pay her a visit several months ago, and has abandoned them. The information from North Carolina is that the editor has removed or disposed of all his effects and disappeared.

**Successful Flying Machine.**  
BERLIN, June 11.—A new airship invented by Herr Weissmann, a mechanic, has been tried here. It ascended 29 metres and flew 15, landing safely. The car rocked violently during its flight, owing to imperfect construction. Herr Weissmann will reconstruct the machine, using paper mache and aluminium.

**Postmaster Gets One Year.**  
RALEIGH, June 7.—In the United States district court here Postmaster C. W. Battle, a negro, was convicted of embezzlement and sentenced to one year in jail. He is the third negro postmaster convicted of this crime during this term, all from the second or black district.

**Capital Stock Increased.**  
LANCASTER, S. C., June 11.—At a meeting of the directors of the Lancaster cotton mill it was decided to increase the capital stock to \$1,000,000. The present mill has 12,000 spindles and the capital stock is \$150,000. When completed, the mill will have 62,000 spindles.

**Scalded Her Child to Death.**  
TIMONSVILLE, S. C., June 11.—Mrs. P. R. Bowen of this place accidentally scalded her little child to death. The mother threw a kettle of boiling water out of the window striking the child in the face, inflicting injuries from which the child died a few hours later.

**Rich Find of Iron Ore.**  
RALEIGH, June 7.—Iron ore, said to be of quality, has been found in the northern portion of this county. It may be part of the same orebed as that in Johnston county, which is now being mined, the ore going to the Greensboro iron and steel works.

**Work Has Begun.**  
ALLENSDALE, S. C., June 11.—The Southern Railway company has begun work on the new line direct from Allendale to Hardeeville.

**TRIBUTE TO THE FILIPINOS.**  
General Otis Says They are the Best of Any Asiatic Race.  
WASHINGTON, June 13.—During General Otis' afternoon at the war department in conference with the heads of the various departments in regard to the condition and needs of the army in the Philippines, he had many questions to answer in his intercourse with his friends respecting present and future conditions in the Philippines, and of these he talked quite freely. He made one statement in particular, which came as a distinct surprise in view of the fact that he has spent a year and a half in the Philippines, for he declared those Filipinos were without question the best of any of the Asiatic races living on the Pacific coast and Islands. He paid a high tribute to their acquisitiveness, saying that the young and old were alike anxious to learn from the Americans. The demand for schools on the American plan was insatiable. "They want the American school books and declare their children will be better educated from them. The Filipino children learn rapidly. Even the old natives see the text books in an effort to fix English phrases in their mind. There was a dearth of teachers at first. The natives often have recourse to the soldiers who know a little Spanish and so are capable for detail as teachers."

**Two Important Captures.**  
WASHINGTON, June 13.—General MacArthur, at Manila, has called the war department as follows: "Report capture Generals Hizon, near Mexico, and Cervantes, at Manila, both important, latter very important leader of guerrillas in Pangasinan province (Luzon)." General Corbin attaches considerable importance to these captures. He thinks they are in the nature of surrenders and indicate that the principal leaders of the insurgents are abandoning the cause and coming into Manila to accept American supremacy.

**LYNCHING OF SIMON ADAMS.**  
Was Thrown Into the River and Told to Swim.  
COLUMBIA, Ga., June 13.—It is learned that Simon Adams, the negro lynched near here, was thrown into the river and ordered to swim for his life. Before throwing him into the river, the mob put a heavy chain around his neck, but notwithstanding this handicap and the swift current, the negro made a heroic struggle for life, and thinking he would escape, the crowd opened fire on him from the bank, severely wounding him. He continued to struggle, however, diving as he went. His last dive is said to have been some 10 feet, and as he came up a Winchester bullet lodged in his head, killing him.
