## JOHNSTONE FOR THE SENATE.

## AN ORDINANCE.

Against Carrying Pistols or Revolvers.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Union, S. C. in Council assembled and by the authority of said Council:

Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, excepting a duly and lawfully appointed or elected peace officer, to carry on their persons a pistol or a revolver, of less than three pounds in weight or less than twenty-one inches in length.

Sec. 2. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, excepting a resident of the Town of Union, to sell, transfer, lease or rent any pistol or revolver of less weight than three pounds and less than twenty-one inches in length.

Sec. 3. That any one found guilty of violating this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars or to be imprisoned or made to work on the streets and public places of the Town of Union for not more than thirty days and as the discretion of the Mayor or Town Council.

Sec. 4. That all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances conflicting with this ordinance are hereby declared repealed.

## AN ORDINANCE.

Against the Operation of Certain Slot Machines.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Union, S. C. in Council assembled and by authority of said Council:

Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to run, operate, or manage any slot machine paying or offering to pay premium in money, within the Town of Union, S. C.

Sec. 2. That any one found guilty of violating this ordinance shall, upon conviction be made to pay a fine of not more than twenty-five (\$25) Dollars or less than Five (\$5) Dollars or to be imprisoned or made to work on the streets and public places of the Town of Union for not less than ten days or more than thirty days and as the discretion of Mayor or Town Council.
