ORDINANCE

Granting Special Licenses, by Town of Union, S. C., For the Fiscal Year Beginning May 1, 1903.

Enacted by the Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Union, S. C., in Council assembled and by the authority of same.

That every person, firm, company or corporation engaged in, or intending to engage in any trade, business or profession hereinafter mentioned, within the limits of the town of Union, shall first obtain a license from the said Clerk and Treasurer, and all licenses herein mentioned shall be non-transferable except by special permission from the Mayor or Town Council, and per annum, if not otherwise specially provided. And all licenses shall expire on May 1, 1904, but may be revoked at any time by the Mayor or Town Council.

Section 1. No person, firm or corporation shall be engaged in, prosecute or carry on any business, occupation or profession herein mentioned without first receiving from the town Clerk and Treasurer, upon the order of the Mayor, a special license therefor, to-wit:

Sec. 2. Every itinerant, trader or other person (except licensed auctioneers) offering for sale or attempting to sell by sample within the town at public outcry, or otherwise any goods, wares, merchandise, fancy articles, spectacles, jewelry, pictures, notions, or other articles of like character, or kind, shall pay in advance a license of not less than ten (\$10) dollars per day, fifty (\$50.00) dollars per week, or three hundred (\$300) dollars per year.

Sec. 3. Every itinerant physician or vendor or seller of medicine, patent or of his own make, or practicing as an itinerant in his profession or calling, shall pay a license of not less than ten (\$10) dollars per day or fifty (\$50) dollars per week.

Sec. 4. Every person or persons peddling or selling within the corporate limits, fruit, poultry, vegetables, butter, eggs or other like articles of produce, shall pay a license of thirty (\$30) dollars per annum. Provided, that this section shall not be held to apply to sellers of produce and like characters raised on farms in Union county, S. C.

Sec. 5. Each and every dealer or company retailing fresh meats, such as beef, mutton, pork, fish or oysters and the like, shall pay a license of seventy-five (\$75) dollars per year and shall have a fixed place of business, and said dealer shall not be permitted to sell from any other place.

Sec. 6. Each and every dealer or company retailing fresh meats, such as mutton, beef, pork, and the like, without privilege of selling fish or oysters, shall pay a license of fifty (\$50) dollars per year, and shall have a fixed place of business, which said place shall be mentioned in the license, and said dealer shall not be permitted to sell from any other place. Provided that section five of this ordinance shall not apply to persons selling any of the aforesaid kinds of meat in quantities of not less than one quarter of the animal. Such person or persons desiring to sell by the quarter shall first apply to the Mayor for a per-

mit, which shall set forth the following facts: 1. The name and post office address of the person proposing to sell. 2. That the animal or animals to be butchered was born and raised on or upon the farm of the proposed vendor. 3. That the meat to be offered is in sound and wholesome condition. Upon said affidavit, and the Mayor shall issue an order to the Clerk and Treasurer of the town of Union, S. C., to grant said vendor a permit to sell said meat without license.

Each agent or dealer in maps, books, periodicals and other like articles, three dollars per day or per year \$ 25 00

For each agent or solicitor for subscriptions for shares or stock of any non-resident Building and Loan Association, per day 100 00

Auctioneer in house or on street, per day, not less than 1 00

For each chair in barber shop Bill posters, posting, tacking or distributing 20 00

Bill posters, itinerant, not less than, per day 2 00

For each billiard room 25 00

For each person, persons or company keeping bicycles for rent 10 00

For each two-horse carriage, buggy or hack kept for hire outside of a livery stable 15 00

For each one-horse carriage, buggy or hack kept for hire outside of a livery stable 10 00

Each person making a business of buying and selling cattle, hogs, sheep, and such like for profit or gain, per annum 25 00

Each person, persons or company selling coal for profit or gain 10 00

For each circus, per day 100 00

For each 3-horse or more dray 15 00

For each two horse dray 10 00

For each one-horse dray 5 00

Express company and oil company transacting and doing business in this town and other point or points within this State, for corporations other than the government of the United States, its officers and agents. Express company 50 00 Oil company 50 00

Exhibitions out of opera house or upon the streets in the discretion of the Mayor

For each flying jenny 200 00

For each flying jenny, per day \$10, per week \$50, or per month \$100.

Fair, concerts, festivals or parties for gain, on Main street, per night or day, not less than one dollar and at the discretion of the Mayor.

Each fruit trader agent 5 00

For each dealer selling fresh fish outside of house on Main street 150 00

For each dealer selling fresh fish in house on Main street 50 00

For each dealer selling fresh fish more than 100 feet from Main street 50 00

For each laundry located outside of the town of Union soliciting and receiving laundry within the town to be

shipped out and returned 50 00

For each solicitor soliciting labor from the town of Union for points beyond corporate limits, per day 25 00

Each and every person running an ice wagon or dealing in ice 25 00

Each soda fountain 5 00

Each ice cream saloon 5 00

Each person selling ice cream on street 5 00

Lunch dealers, per day 1 00

Livery, feed and sale stables not including street carriages or drays 10 00

Each agent or dealer (who has no annual license) selling mules or horses \$5 per day or \$20 per week, or mules and horses at auction per day 10 00

For each lecture, musical entertainment, play or show for reward outside of opera house (in discretion of the Mayor) 10 00

Each oculist or optician, itinerant per day 10 00

For each opera house 10 00

Each oyster saloon with privilege of selling bulk oysters per year 10 00

For each pawn broker 10 00

For each photograph gallery 10 00

For each itinerant photographer, per day 10 00

For each itinerant plumber 10 00

For each side show, per day 10 00

For each itinerant sewing machine agent or dealer 10 00

Itinerant stove dealers, per day 10 00

For each boot or shoe black with privilege of chair on street 10 00

For each shooting gallery 10 00

For each skating rink \$5.00 per month, or per year 50 00

For each railroad for business done within the State and not including that done without the State 10 00

For each restaurant 10 00

For each ten pin alley 10 00

Each telegraph company operating an office within the corporate limits of the town of Union shall pay a license per annum of 10 00

Each telephone company transacting and doing business between any points in this town or any other point or points in this State for individuals or corporations other than the government of the United States, its officers and agents 10 00

Each wool yard 10 00

For each and every business which shall be char-

discretion of the Mayor or Town Council.

Sec. 8. Any person, persons, company, firm or corporation embraced or mentioned in any of the foregoing sections or section of this ordinance and required therein to obtain license or to pay for the performing or carrying on of their respective business or for the transaction of the same, who shall fail, refuse or neglect to pay the license or amount therein specified in advance, and each and every person, firm or corporation giving, showing, or attempting to give or show any of the performances, shows, or exhibitions without having received and paid for their license to do so, and any person or persons, firm or corporation violating any part or parts of this ordinance, shall be subject to and for and required to pay a fine of not less than one dollar per day for each and every day so offended, or not more than one hundred dollars per day, or to be imprisoned and made to work on the streets and public places of the town for not more than thirty days for each day so offended, and at the discretion of the Mayor or Town Council.

Sec. 9. That all licenses herein mentioned are due and collectible beginning May 1, 1903.

Done and ratified in Council as assembled under the hand of the Mayor and seal of the Council this seventh day of April, 1903.

works, electric lights and water improvement bonds.

Sec. 3. That a tax of eight and one half [8 1/2] mills upon every dollar of the value of real estate, personal property and stock in trade is hereby levied to meet the ordinary expenses of municipal government of said town for the fiscal year beginning the first day of May, 1903.

Sec. 4. That the sum of two (2) dollars be fixed as commutation for the street or road duty, and the said sum to be paid by all able-bodied male persons able to perform or cause to be performed the labor herein required, between the ages of eighteen [18] and fifty (50) years, who reside within the corporate limits of said town, except ordained ministers and those exempt by law, and any person liable to this tax, who shall fail to pay within the time specified, shall be required to work upon the streets of Union four days under the direction of the street overseer, and any person failing either to pay said commutation or perform said labor shall be brought before the mayor's court and, upon conviction, shall be fined in a sum not exceeding ten (10) dollars or imprisonment not exceeding twenty (20) days either or both.

Sec. 5. That one-half of the taxes herein levied and assessed shall be due and collected in the month of May, 1903 and the remaining half shall be due and collected during the month of October 1903.

Sec. 6. That the town Clerk and Treasurer shall proceed to collect one-half of the taxes herein levied, and that he shall keep his books open from the first day of May, next, to the first day of June, 1903, for this purpose; after which time he shall proceed by distress or otherwise, as prescribed by law, to collect such as remains unpaid, with a penalty of twenty (20) per cent. and cost of collecting added.

Sec. 7. That the town Clerk and Treasurer shall re-open his books and keep them open from the first day of October next to the first day of November, 1903, for the purpose of collecting the remaining half of the taxes herein levied, after which time he shall proceed by distress or otherwise as prescribed by law to collect such as remains unpaid with a penalty of twenty (20) per cent. and cost of collecting added.

Sec. 8. That the basis of value for taxation of real estate, personal property and stock in trade, shall be taken from assessments as levied by the County Auditor in 1902 and 1903.

Sec. 9. That ALL Ordinances or part of ordinances conflicting with

this Ordinance are hereby declared repealed.
