NEW YORK, April 17 .- The steamship Baltic, Capt. Comstock, after a boisterous passage of nearly fifteen days, has arrived off Sandy Hook, where she remains in a dense fog. Her papers have been brought up to the city in a steam tug. The Baltic sailed on Wednesday, April 2, and her news is therefore four days later than that received by the Cambria.

The most important itom in the Baltic's news is the fact that a treaty of peace was signed and formally proclaimed at Paris, on Sunday, the 30th ult. The joyful tidings were announced in Paris and London, by salves of artillery. Paris was brilliantly illuminated, and at England the church bells rang out their merry penls.

Three or four weeks must clapse before he final ratifications are exchanged, as the details of adjustment have been referred to a commission.

The Paris correspondent of the London held at the Tuilleries on Saturday, the 29th, at half-past 11 o'clock, and remained in ses sion until 12 o'clock on Sunday. The Emperor was presented to the Council, and presided. He gave the last instructions. Count Walewski then returned to his official residence to receive the Plenipoten-

tiaries. They came at half-past 12, and after the treaty was read over, each one proceeded to sign it. The moment the signatures were comple-
