SEC. 7. And be it further Ordained by the Δu-

law for the collection of all such fines, taxes and
double taxes as may be imposed by this Ordinance; which executions and final process shall
be issued under the corporation, and directed to
the Town Marshal, or other person specially appointed by the Council to collect the same, and
be enforced and executed against the property
and person of defaulters to the same extent and
in the same manner as is provided by law for the in the same manner as is provided by law for the collection of the general State tax.
