After the usual study of the S. S. lesson, Sunday morning on the subject "Obedience to Law," the School was addressed by Prof. Dow, a native of

Africa, who came to America, has been educated in the schools of America and England, and is now one of the newly elected instructors at Allen University. The address was very clear, pointed and enjoyed very much by the school.

At 11:15 a. m. Dr. E. A. Adams introduced Prof. Dow to a very large audience to preach. Preliminary to his text he told of his coming to this country and his service as a minister for 19 years, also that he felt somewhat lonesome, but seeing and learning more and more of the people of Columbia, he felt sure this spell would soon leave. He selected the 137th Psalm 1st verse. Subject: "Spiritual Desolation." Timely applications of the Christian church and members were made during the discourse. Asserted: "People in the church are like a radio—to get in harmony with the place you desire, you must tune in on that place; you cannot tune in on Hell and expect to hear from Heaven—this is practiced by good church members, some times they pay, they attend the services, they render important service, but they can't get in harmony with Heaven because they have tuned in on Hell."

The sermon was highly pleasing. At 4 p. m. Dr. J. C. Lewis, P. E. of the A. M. E. Zion Church, Columbia District, preached for the benefit of Bro. Wheeler's Club. He selected St. Luke 18:1, latter clause: "Men ought always to pray and not to faint." Dr. Lewis cited many instances where it was plainly seen that it pays to pray always. But he said you must tune your heart to pray if you would have your prayers answered. The sermon was very good, satisfying and pleasing through.

The sessions of the A. C. E. League were very good, many of the young people taking an active part in the discussion of the topic (Missionary) and rendered many delightful musical numbers. Come to the session next Sunday. You will enjoy it undoubtedly.
