The refusal of Dr. Benjamin Brawley to accept the Harmon Award for his accomplishment in the field of education is a matter of especial significance. Of the thirteen Negroes awarded prizes by the Harmon Foundation in creative work during 1927, Dr. Benjamin Brawley was the only one to refuse.

Dr. Brawley has never been regarded as unconscious of his great contribution to the fields of Negro history and literature. Even in his old age he told the press that all his life he had strictly first-class work and was not willing to accept anything that looked like a reward for the second order of merit.

Dr. Brawley has received honors everywhere a reward for his books on Negro history and its seems probable he should enjoy a young scholar's book, he was given a check for a single year's accomplishment. He should throw his coat under the label of his coat, "kick up his heels" and say "That's all."
