NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF COLLEGIATE DEANS AND REGISTRARS ELECTS S. C. SON

AS SECRETARY

The National Association of Collegiate Deans and Registrars in Negro Schools met at Fisk University, Nashville, Tennessee, March 1-3. This Association is composed of all Negro institutions in America interested in higher education and having college departments. The five colleges from South Carolina were able to represent by Dean Hubert, of Morris College; Dean Thompson and Registrar Devaughn of Allen; Dean Pearson of Claflin and Dean Gregg Registrar Spann of State and Dean Redfern of Benedict.

The subject discussed was the Negro College Curricula and survey made on this subject by Deans Bradley and Gregg and Professor Doyle were received with but slight recommendations and changes. Dean Redfern of Benedict College, ably served as chairman of the committee on findings which report was also well received.

On Friday, March 2nd, before the faculty, student body, white and colored citizens of Nashville, Dean Gregg of State delivered the Annual Address on "The Negro and the Liberal Arts College." All sessions were profitable and displayed much study and research on the part of the participants.

South Carolina and State College were singularly honored by the election of Professor Gregg as Secretary of the National Association whose duties among other things will entail publishing the Bulletin of the Association. The next meeting of the Association will be held in Prairie View, Texas.

WAR DEPARTMENT TELLS N. A. A. C. P. LAST HOUSTON MARTYR BUT 1 RELEASED

New York, Mar 15—All but one member of the 23rd U. S. Infantry, imprisoned in connection with the Houston, Texas riot of 1917, have now been released according to a letter from the U. S. Disciplinary Barracks at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, to the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, 69 Fifth Avenue.

In this letter Col. A. A. Hickox, Parole Officer, informs the N. A. A. C. P. that Robert Smith has been paroled under date of February 2, and was released February 29, leaving only one "Houston Martyr" in prison.

The man still imprisoned was denied parole because of a "poor conduct record" during his imprisonment.

The N. A. A. C. P. has been fighting for the release of the 24th Infantrymen since the riot in 1917, and has repeatedly announced its intention of following their cases until the last man has been liberated on parole. Monster petitions have been presented to two presidents under the auspices of the N. A. A. C. P., the cases of the soldiers being reviewed by the War Department and their terms shortened in consequence. The last petition, to President Coolidge, bore
